Project Highlights

- Woodland will sequester more than 350,000 tonnes
 CO2e over 100 years.
- Project will create 1,500 hectares of Scots pine, birch, oak, alder and Sitka Spruce.
- The area houses direct descendants of Scotland's wildcat population, the proposed woodland scheme would provide all the ingredients to rejuvenate, one of the world's most endangered mammals.
- Designated Special Protection Area (SPA) for nesting golden eagles.

Project Background

The scheme represents the restoration of an iconic highland landscape, involving a large area of ecological regeneration.

Originally the site was populated by broadleaf woodland and inhabited by eagles, badgers, red squirrels, pine martins, otters and a large mix of songbirds.

Excessive levels of grazing by sheep and deer have gradually undermined the site's ecology which this new scheme aims to restore.

The scheme which is currently in the design phase will be planted with a mix of Scots pine, birch, oak, alder and Sitka Spruce. These will provide the foundations for regenerating the local ecology.

Ecological Features

The land houses the last direct descendants of Scotland's wildcat population. Listed as a 'priority species' under the UK's Biodiversity Action Plan and as an 'Endangered Species' under UK and EU law, the proposed woodland scheme would provide all the natural ingredients to rejuvenate one of the world's most endangered mammals.

Part of the scheme is a designated Special Protection Area (SPA) for nesting golden eagles.

Historic Lands

The scheme would be situated on historically-significant clan lands which play an important part in the local community. The young owner is taking a progressive, open-minded and inclusive approach to opening up the land and making it economically viable.

Much of the clan lands is barely good enough for sheep grazing so it earns minimal income. As a result, he is considering all opportunities and is open to new ideas and suggestions for making the estate more viable. This would also have positive implications for the local community.
